## Summer Packets

The <u>Elementary Summer Packets</u> include 20 days of literacy, math, science and social studies activities to prepare students for the upcoming school year. For example, kindergarten students will engage in activities aligned to first grade concepts or skills. These are *optional* resources to share with families.



The <u>Family Loft</u> is a website to help support young scholars. We know that the adults who spend time with students out of schools time need more information about what skills students are learning throughout the year, and effective strategies to practice and support learning. We created the Family Loft to help bridge that gap. You can use this site by exploring the grade level milestones page to learn about what milestones are and how you can support them at home. From there, you can find out what reading and math look and sound like at a particular grade level milestone and what specific skills children need to master. As a reminder, each child will progress differently: your child may still be learning skills from a previous grade or may have already mastered the grade-level milestones in this document. The goal is for your child to have access to grade level instruction while receiving individualized support where it is needed. Talk to your teacher about your child's specific needs.
