MC in 3 + 1@ CP Dual Enrollment

- MC in 3 plus 1 at CP is unique to Mallard Creek.
- 300+ different CPCC courses being taken currently
- Students in their 10th grade year meet with their counselor during registration to choose MC in 3 plus 1 at CPCC
- The counselor, student, and parent will register for remaining high school requirements to take in their junior year.
- Senior year will be completely at CPCC in order to take advantage of Free college courses. You must earn a C or better for courses to transfer to the public colleges in NC.
- College transfer courses at CP provide 1 additional quality point.
- Currently 2 seniors at MCHS are scheduled to earn their Associate's Degree in 4 years and it will be earned prior to their high school graduation! They will be saving their families 2 years of tuition!

We often recommend students attempt honors prior to enrolling in their first AP class. If you are/have been an honors student, we find quite a few of our 9th graders attempt World History as their first AP class. The AP arts and Computer Science courses are other options.

We do not limit enrollment in AP classes based on grades, prior course sequences/placements (standard, honors, etc...), or the like. We work with all students but all enrolled must meet the criteria for completion and sit for the AP exam in May. 



2D Art and Design

This portfolio is intended to address two-dimensional (2-D) design issues.

Design involves purposeful decision making about how to use the elements and principles of art in an integrative way.

DRAWING

The Drawing Portfolio is intended to address a very broad interpretation of drawing issues and media. Line quality, light and shade, rendering of form, composition, surface manipulation, the illusion of depth and mark-making are drawing issues that can be addressed through a variety of means, which could include painting, printmaking, mixed media, etc. Abstract, observational, and invented works may demonstrate drawing competence.

3D Art and Design

This portfolio is intended to address sculptural issues. Design involves purposeful decision making about using the elements and principles of art in an integrative way. In the 3-D Design Portfolio, students are asked to demonstrate their understanding of design principles as they relate to the integration of depth and space, volume and surface.



AP Art history is designed to be a college level survey course approved by College Board. Students will learn from a College Board set list of 250 artworks chronologically, beginning with Paleolithic painting/sculpture and ending with Post-Modernist contemporary artists (a number of artworks will be added throughout the year in addition to the set list).

The course will spend the most time on Renaissance art to the 21st century. We will explore ancient through the Medieval ages, and global arts including Africa, the ancient North and South Americas, Asia, Near East, Oceania, and Islamic traditions. Throughout the year the students will be guided by Essential Questions put forth by College Board; What is art and how is it made? Why and how does art change? How do we describe our thinking about art? How does art tell the history of our world?

Looking at art from the past contributes to who we are as people. By looking at what has been done before, we gather knowledge and inspiration that contribute to how we speak, feel, and view the world around us.


